Visitor Guidelines for Kaiser Permanente Moanalua Campus Effective 8/24/21

- Patients in any area of the Moanalua campus (including inpatient hospital units and ambulatory care units on the campus) will be allowed one adult visitor (18 years or over) at a time inside the facility. Exceptions to this policy may be considered on a case-by-case basis by the Chief Nurse or Hospital Administrator for extenuating circumstances such as end of life care, childcare accommodation or patients needing separate mobility/disability support. Children granted an exception must be able to comply with all infection prevention measures including mask wearing.
- 2. All visitors, regardless of vaccination status, will be screened for COVID-19 symptoms before being permitted to enter any facility. Persons with symptoms of active infectious illness, or in quarantine following exposure to COVID-19 or isolation for COVID-19, will not be allowed to enter any facility as a visitor (this does not apply to persons seeking medical care for themselves, as directed).
- 3. All visitors, <u>regardless of vaccination status</u>, must wear a well-fitting face mask while in the facility including while in the patient's room. Visitors may be asked to wear KP-provided mask.
- 4. Visitors must use the required Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) when visiting patients on transmissionbased precautions. Appropriate PPE will be supplied by Kaiser as necessary.
- 5. Visitors should limit movement in the facility and go directly to and from the patient's room.
- 6. Visitors are not allowed to drink or eat while visiting in the patient's room unless permission is granted by a member of the patient's care team.

The following requirements apply to all visitors entering a facility on the Moanalua campus other than Labor & Delivery, Pediatrics, NICU and OB Ultrasound:

- 7. All visitors must have vaccination status verified. Visitors must either provide proof of that they are fully vaccinated or documentation verifying a negative SARS-CoV-2 test performed no more than 72 hours prior to the visit. "Fully Vaccinated" means two weeks or more have passed since administration of the second dose in a 2-dose vaccination series or after administration of a single-dose vaccine.
 - a. Proof of vaccination must be in one of the following forms:
 - COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card (issued by the Department of Health and Human Services Centers for Disease Control & Prevention or WHO Yellow Card) which includes name of vaccinated, type of vaccine provided, and date last dose administered, OR
 - A photo of a Vaccination Record Card as a separate document; OR
 - A photo of the client's Vaccination Record Card stored on a phone or electronic device; OR
 - Documentation of COVID-19 vaccination from a health care provider; OR
 - Digital record that includes a QR code that when scanned by a SMART Health Card reader displays to the reader client name, date of birth, vaccine dates and vaccine type.

b. Unvaccinated or partially vaccinated visitors must show documentation of a negative SARS-CoV-2 test where the specimen collection occurred within 72 hours before each visit and for which the test results are available at the time of entry to the facility. Visitors may use either PCR testing or antigen testing. Any test used must either have Emergency Use Authorization by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration or be operating per the Laboratory Developed Test requirements by CMS.
